The Ivankovich's conducted their first all-Wallace Nutting Consignment Auction in 1988, selling nearly 500 lots of Wallace Nutting pictures, books, furniture, and memorabilia in Framingham, MA. The enthusiasm generated by this Auction has led to nearly 100 more Catalog Auctions.

A frequent lecturer on Wallace Nutting, Mike has written articles for most major trade papers, has appeared on various radio and television programs, and is frequently consulted by antique columnists from throughout the country. He also provides Wallace Nutting Appraisal Services.
